SILENT PRAYER TO HEAR GOD'S VOICE

People need to carve time out of their day to dedicate to silent prayer or meditation in order to hear what God has to say, said Pope Benedict XVI. Continuing a series about influential Christian writers from the Middle Ages, the pope focused on the life of St. Peter Damian, an 11th-century monk, cardinal and doctor of the church. Living an austere, secluded life in a cloister, St. Peter Damian determined that "the hermetic life was the apex of Christian life" because it allowed one to be free from the ego and from worldly concerns, said the pope.
