BABY UPDATE - 17 TO 24 WEEKS OLD



Have you given your baby a name? Babies can routinely be saved at 21 to 22 weeks after fertilization, and sometimes they can be saved even younger. Please pray for your baby.

✧ Week 17: The baby can have dream (REM) sleep.

✧ Week 20: The baby recognizes its mothers voice.

20 weeks is also the earliest stage at which Partial birth abortions are performed.

✧ Months 5 & 6: At the end of the 6th month the baby is twelve inches long or more, and weighs up to 1 ½ lbs. Oil and sweat glands are now functioning and the inner ear is fully developed.

He or she:

✧ practices breathing by inhaling amniotic fluid into its developing lungs.

✧ grasps at the umbilical cord when he/she feels it.

✧ can suck a thumb, yawn, stretch, hiccup, make faces.

✧ responds to sounds by moving or increasing its pulse.

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS - FOR COUPLES

What can you do for your marriage in 2010? Try making a New Year's resolution to improve your relationship.

Here are some ideas to get started:

1. Agree to go out for regular dates--weekly or, at least, monthly. See Weekly Dating Tips.
2. Would you like to improve your communication skills? Start by taking one or more of our Marriage Quizzes.
3. Draw up your 2010 household budget together. Discuss spending priorities, including charitable donations. Before you start, read our article on Finances.
4. Set aside a regular time each week to pray together. If couple prayer seems awkward at first, read *Who me, pray? With her?*
5. Resolve to read at least one book on how to strengthen your relationship. Unsure where to start? Browse through the archived book reviews.
6. Dust up your religious education. Read a brief summary of what the church teaches about marriage. Why is marriage a sacrament, as well as a vocation? What is marital spirituality? See About Catholic Marriage/Catholic Beliefs.
7. Marriage is also a sacrament of service, given not just for the couple's good, but for the good of their family, community, & the Church. Resolve to do at least one service activity this year, as a family or a couple.
